#### SDNR Referendum Information

On Monday, January 15, 2024, the School District of New Richmond Board of Education adopted a resolution to hold a capital referendum to address facility needs and community growth. The Board of Education appreciated the recommendations provided by our Community Facility Committee which spent months studying and preparing important information for the Board to consider.

This resolution came to the Board of Education from the Community Facility Committee, after months of collaboration between Wold Architects (the SDNR's facility planning partner), the Community Facility Committee, and the District Administration. The committee consisted of 47 participants, which was composed of 8 community members, 23 parents, 12 staff members, and 4 students. The committee toured each school building and held multiple meetings to establish facility priorities based on various represented stakeholders.

The Board of Education then requested stakeholder feedback from the entire School District of New Richmond Community through a community survey facilitated by School Perceptions in late October. Engaging our community and hearing your voices was imperative to form a recommendation to the Board of Education that reflected the community's response to facility needs and district growth. The results were then presented to the Board of Education in late November. The Board voted to pursue the referendum.



The referendum vote will take place on April 2, 2024. Additional information regarding the referendum will be available in the coming weeks via website, email, district communication, newsletters, mailers, community meetings, etc. Thank you for your continued support of the School District of New Richmond and the students we serve.

Our second math competition will be at NRMS on February 8. The final math masters competition of the year will be March 8 at St. Croix Central Middle School.

#### MathCounts - NRMS

New Richmond Middle School 7th and 8th grade students participate in MathCounts coached by Mr. Wilcox. Students this year have attended several practice competitions including Hudson, Rice Lake and here at NRMS. Our MathCounts participants have had strong showings at all competitions this season so far.

At Hudson, competition was tough, but NRMS came out strong.

The competition was held at Dakota County Technical College on Saturday January 20.

#### Agriscience Happenings - By Rachel A. Sauvola, Agriscience Instructor

It was a fabulous finish to the first semester as students worked hard to finish strong.

Large Animal Science students continued to work with their steers at the school farm, forming relationships with the cattle and getting them to trust that they had their best interest at heart. Leroy continued to be the highlight now that he's grown to well over 500 pounds and you can't even tell that his leg was broken last summer. It's also so crazy that no matter the temperature, he just wants to play in the water and drink from the hose.

As we talked about animal identification, we also had our infamous pig ear notching lab, where the students become piglets in a drove (that's what you call pigs hanging out together) and notch their ears for others to read. It's always a fun day! Comparing this method to ear tagging, tattooing and branding, students get a feel for all of these management tools for different species on ranches and farms.



Large Animal Science and Food Science students met with my friends from Land O'Lakes to learn about the cooperative and all that they do in agriculture. Known for making the cheese powder on Cheetos, students learned the process from farm to table for that commodity and more. It was a great experience for all involved to see the impact a local entity makes on our food chain each and every day.

Also in Food Science, students had the great opportunity to participate in several lunch and learns touring Lakeside Foods and watching carrots go from the farm to the table, Power's Wild Game - watching deer be processed from hanging carcass to venison sticks ready to eat, and Ross' Meats in Glenwood City - meeting our school butchers and learning all about the new facility they built to handle all of the customers and farmers they serve.



Food Science students also saw the culmination of an entire semester of growing food in the greenhouse. We had the most amazing carrot crop we've ever had grown in there! They used their food products to cook us something for the final exam. From cauliflower wings to fresh salad, fajitas with SOAR

beef and veggies, egg rolls and chicken enchiladas... our stomachs were full as we celebrated the students' great work. We also closed out the semester with some global exploration as we studied what food science is like in other countries across the globe.

Other fun labs were conducted while we studied fats and sweeteners in our food - creating cup cakes using different sources of butter found in the grocer store - I Can't Believe It's Not Butter, Parkay Butter Spray, Land O'Lakes Fresh Buttery Taste Spread, 60/40, real butter and more. For sweeteners, we tested things like Splenda, Sweet and Low, Stevia, honey and others. It was a great semester learning and growing in our want to be knowledgeable consumers.

Small Animal Science students finished up their dog show with our amazing community judges - Officer Aaron Anderson, Lacey Sandow, Karen Parks and Jenny Larson. Each of the judges also made a dog for the show and they surprised the kids with their amazing artistic skills. Officer Aaron was voted Students' Choice Award with his husky.

Students also finished up the semester with a better understanding of how much it really costs to have a dog with the math associated with feeding the dog. Having a better understanding of generic food and the nutrients it presents vs. a more expensive food and the canned vs. semi moist vs. dry food styles, helps students decide what is best for their dog and them long term.



They enjoyed bringing their dogs to school for the live dog lab where we assess the overall health of the dog respiratory rate, heart rate, skin, nails, hydration and more. Acting like a Vet Tech, students gain the hands-on experience of restraining the dog for various tests and what it's like to see/work with an unfamiliar dog.

In the small animal lab, students welcomed Patches, a new bunny that came to us from a local family who had received more rabbits than they could handle. Imagine our surprise when two weeks later Patches gifted us with three kits (that's what baby rabbits are called) - but one was stillborn and one died the second day, so we have one very active and adorable baby left.



We appreciate Jean Gustafson coming over with Bert and Seele, our district therapy dogs to showcase dog training to our Small Animal Science students


too. It was a great way to engage the students in being


the trainer and using their voice commands. Jean also taught about the treats and food she gives her dogs and about some of the necessary equipment that makes dog training easier.



As you can imagine, we've been dealing with all sorts of mud as temps didn't allow it to be totally frozen for long. This is such a strange winter and has taught us many lessons on the impacts of weather on animals and farming.



I had the opportunity to visit with Inga Witscher from PBS's Around the Farm Table and view her cooking demo at the Heritage Center courtesy of the New Richmond Public Library.
